

Prospect North at the Arctic Circle Assembly, Iceland


The Prospect North exhibition was Scotland's contribution – as a collateral event – to the Venice Architecture Biennale in 2016. Following its month long presence in Venice the exhibition toured to Oban, Glasgow and Dundee.

It also travelled to the Arctic Circle Assembly in Reykjavik, Iceland, where it was officially launched by Nicola Sturgeon, the First Minister of Scotland.



A Brisk Walk - Audio Tour

As part of the Say Hello to Architecture programme we teamed up with Walking Heads Tours to create an audio tour of buildings at risk in Glasgow. A Brisk Walk is narrated by Professor Johnny Rodger and is illustrated by Rae-Yen Song.



Eastwood Health and Care Centre

Designed by Hoskins Architects and commissioned by NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde and East Renfrewshire Council, the Eastwood Health and Care Centre won the NHSHealth Scotland Design Awards at the end of 2016.


An exemplary design it is based on providing suitable accommodation to support the further integration of health and care along with wider council and third sector services in line with national policy direction.

Doors Open Day Glasgow

Say Hello to Architecture was out in force during the Glasgow Doors Open Day weekend in September, where we ran a number of activities for the whole family, and collaborated with the Traditional Building Forum to give visitors hands on experience of building. Over 150 visitors took part over the two days.



Outdoor Learning Animation

Launched in 2016 this animation looks at what outdoor learning can mean in its widest form. The school can be seen as the hub from which learning radiates out into the school grounds, the immediate surroundings, the wider town and community: the classroom is no longer the only, or always the best, place for learning.



Learning Estate Conference

The Learning Estate Conference hosted by Scottish Government, and supported by Architecture and Design Scotland and Scottish Futures Trust, was held in March 2016 with the purpose of challenging our response to the needs of modern learning, exploring best international practice and to debate priorities. A number of outputs from the event are available on the A&DS website.



Stalled Spaces Scotland

Stalled Spaces Scotland is a national programme commissioned by the Scottish Government and managed by A&DS to encourage and support communities to bring stalled spaces or derelict and vacant land back into temporary use. In 2016 we funded 47 programmes across seven local authorities in Scotland.

Oban Festival of Architecture

The Oban Festival of Architecture was the first outing of the Prospect North exhibition in Scotland, as well as an opportunity to bring together local architecture events with the Scotstyle and Best of the Best exhibitions at the Rockfield Centre. The Oban Festival of Architecture was driven by the community members of the Oban Development Trust and officially launched by Fiona Hyslop MSP, Cabinet Secretary of Culture, Tourism and External Affairs.

Nobody's Home Exhibition

We hosted an exhibition featuring the work of photographer John Maher at The Lighthouse in July – August 2016. Nobody's Home captured abandoned crofts from across the Outer Hebrides and sparked dialogue about possible futures for these abandoned buildings. The exhibition received fantastic feedback from visitors and was covered extensively in the media.


Our Work in 2016

In 2016 our advice services grew in scope and reach, developing new models of support in response to the needs of the public and private sector and a changing landscape of planning and procurement.

Our **Design Forum** process supported 14 projects through 18 engagements, in 10 local authorities, stretching from Ayrshire to Shetland and included major infrastructure projects, masterplans and housing developments.

We continued to work with those charged with providing the best spaces for learners and the delivery of the Curriculum for Excellence. We worked across **19 Local Authority** areas with 47 projects ranging from Early Years provision, primary schools to community learning campuses.

The **Local Authority Urban Design Forum (LAUDF)** supports the exchange of learning and ideas. We facilitated two meetings of the LAUDF group and two meetings of the **Public Sector Client Forum** in the public sector estate, learning from industry, the university estate and public sector estate projects.

We assisted 120 stakeholders (public, patients and staff) to develop design briefs for six major healthcare projects. Through our work on 19 different projects, from Dumfries to Barra, which included community facilities, major hospitals and specialist centres, we helped influence healthcare investments to the value of around £750 million.
